THE Methodist Church provides a unique opportunity of Christian service for Local Preachers. Their number is thirty-four thousand; and, in addition, two and a half thousand Local Preachers on Trial are preparing for the great Vocation. On their efficiency and devotion depends, in no small measure, the advance of the Kingdom of God through the Methodist Church.

No one can do a greater work, in these days, than faithfully to proclaim the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. This is a task that calls forth the highest powers of mind and soul, and demands the best that can be given. Every Local Preacher of the Methodist Church, therefore, should have a working knowledge of the Bible, should seek to understand the fundamental doctrines of the Evangelical Faith and should know something of the distinctive contribution of Methodism to the Universal Church and to the social well-being of Mankind.

In each of the three Churches, now united as The Methodist Church, Courses of Study were arranged to assist, in their reading, those who were preparing to become Local Preachers, and also those who were admitted as Local Preachers. For a number of years invaluable help was thus given by the Local Preachers' Training Movement of the Primitive Methodist Church, through the Scheme of Studies for Local Preachers of the United Methodist Church and by The Union for Biblical and Homiletic Study, commenced in 1892, of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

These Courses of Study have now been merged under the title, Local Preachers' Studies; and particulars of the Correspondence Classes in connection with them are given below. The Classes are arranged for Local Preachers on Trial, Local Preachers and Candidates for the Ministry.

The method of study by means of Correspondence is a distinctly helpful one. The Tutors are anxious to assist their Students and to lead them, by painstaking guidance in reading, to a true understanding and knowledge of the particular subjects and text books being studied.

The most effective help, however, which can be given to those who take these Studies is by the personal contact of a competent Teacher. Therefore, 'The Conference recommends that in every Circuit an endeavour shall be made by the Local Preachers' Meeting to form a Local Preachers' Training Class.'

The Local Preachers' Studies have been prepared so that every Student of a Correspondence Class and of a Circuit Training Class may approach nearer to the ideal of a workman that needeth not to be ashamed.

Above and beyond intellectual equipment, that which matters supremely is the personal surrender to the will of God and the culture of the devotional life. But, the Preacher, who is most earnest in the quest for God, should also be most eager, by studious effort and mental discipline, to comprehend the revelation He has given in His works, in His word and in His Son, our Lord.

LOCAL PREACHERS ON TRIAL

Circuit Local Preachers' Meeting— Oral Examination

Conference Standing Orders.—Before any Candidate shall be fully admitted as a Local Preacher he, or she, must pass an examination conducted by the Superintendent, or under his direction, in loyalty to, and knowledge of, the doctrines of the Evangelical Faith.

These doctrines include: the Fatherhood of God; the Deity of our Lord Jesus Christ; the Person, Mission and Work of the Holy Spirit; the Universality of Sin; the Atonement; Salvation for all by Grace through Faith; the Believer's Privilege of Assurance and of Perfect Love; the Christian Church; the Future Life. These doctrines are defined in The New Catechism issued by the Conference.

The Candidate cannot be fully admitted as a Local Preacher until Wesley's Notes on the New Testament and the first four volumes of his Sermons (the 44 Sermons) have been read. The Candidate is recommended to read:—What is the Old Testament? by Dr. C. Ryder Smith; The New Testament and Its Writers, by Dr. J. A. M'Clymont; Christian Foundations, by Dr. H. Maldwyn Hughes.

Stress is laid in the examination on accurate knowledge of the Bible. At the time of the examination the Candidate shall give an account of his, or her, conversion to God, present Christian experience and call to preach.

Connexional Written Examination

Local Preachers' Meetings having Local Preachers on Trial are strongly urged to advise them to take the Connexional Written Examination, in some at least, if not in all, of the Subjects and the Text Books named in Group A. The Examination paper in Homiletics will have a question requiring a Sermon Outline on one of a number of given Texts.

The Examination will be held twice each year, on the last Fridays and Saturdays in March and September, in a Candidate's own Circuit or at an appropriate Centre. The Subjects and Text Books in Group A, not taken in this Written Examination, should be dealt with in the Local Preachers' Meeting Oral Examination.

Local Preachers on Trial should, as a rule, take two years for these probationary studies, reading half of the Subjects each year. It is suggested that the Subjects of Classes 1, 2 and 3 be taken during the first year and the remainder during the second year. Copies of previous Examination papers on the Text Books of Classes 1 and 4 may be obtained, price 3d., from the Department.

Every Local Preacher on Trial should endeavour, by carefully planning the time for studying the Bible and the Text Books of Group A, to have other periods for more general reading both on the Subjects of the Examination and of other literature.

For this Examination an Entrance Fee of 5s. is charged in order to meet the expenses involved. This Fee should be sent with the Entrance Form.

Intending Candidates for this Examination should consult the University Regulations, which may be obtained from the Department. The Examination begins on the first Tuesday in June and is held in London and at certain Provincial centres. The Entrance Fee is £1. It should be noted that the Text Books in Classes 1 and 5, are also those for Classes B.1 and B.2. Local Preachers, therefore, who have obtained the Committee's Diploma should consider the possibility of reading for this Certificate also.

REGULATIONS & SUGGESTIONS

- 1. All communications regarding *Local Preachers' Studies* should be addressed to Mr. R. Arthur Button, 1, Central Buildings, Westminster, S.W.1.
- 2. All communications requiring a reply must be accompanied with stamp for return postage.
- 3. The Entrance Fee for Student Membership of the Correspondence Classes is 1s., and should be sent with the Entrance Form. This is the only Fee for these Classes.
- 4. Sessions: The Winter Session commences on October 1st and ends on March 31st. The Summer Session commences on April 1st and ends on September 30th.
- 5. Classes will also commence on January 1st after the December Local Preachers' Meeting; and on July 1st after the June Local Preachers' Meeting.
- 6. Method of Work. The monthly scheme of reading and questions on the portions read is given in *The Preacher's and Class Leader's Magazine*. Students will find it helpful to make notes, as they read, for purposes of revision. A Dictionary is an indispensable aid.
- 7. Answering the Monthly Questions. Students should allow at least twenty-four hours' interval between reading any prescribed portion and answering the questions. This Regulation should be strictly observed as the questions are set with the object of testing the Student's knowledge. If the Text Book is referred to while the answers are being written, this fact should be stated in the margin of the Answer Book. In quoting Scripture, the Bible may be used as accuracy is essential. Answers should be sent to the Tutor on or before the 25th of each month.
- 8. Students who are Local Preachers, Local Preachers on Trial, or on Note, may obtain their Text Books and the Magazine at half price. A Book Order Form, obtainable from the Department at the address given above (see par. 1), must be used.
- 9. Answer Books. These may be obtained from The Methodist Publishing House, 25-35, City Road, London, E.C.1, (see Book Order Form), price 9d. for 5. Wrappers, which cover the books for postal purposes, may also be obtained, price 2d. for 12. The Answer Book will pass through the post for ½d. A stamped addressed reply wrapper must be enclosed with each Answer Book sent to the Tutor. A letter must not be enclosed with the Answer Book unless stamp for letter postage is used.
